Year 7 Open Events

English Focus

The study of English at Ernest Bevin College this year has kicked off by introducing the students to new and captivating literary discussions and creative writing projects. Year 7 start their studies will the allimportant exploration of their culture, their heritage, and their identity that culminates in some colourful poster displays, wondrous word poetry and creative autobiographical writing. Year 8 learn the values of honour, respect and duty with tempered and guided exploration of poems from soldiers who have courageously served our country. These poems have led our students to reflect upon the place in society and the conflicts that humankind have had to endure. On November 11, Year 8 will then convey their respect to their community by taking part in a Remembrance Event at St Mary Magdalen Church, listening to war poetry and readings and displaying their work completed during English lessons.

Year 9 have delved into philosophy by studying Fahrenheit 451, the challenging and high-minded novel about morality, censorship and freedom. From this, students will create their own dystopian futures in a piece of creative story writing. To begin their GCSE exam preparation, Year 10 have travelled back in time to read of a Victorian London covered in the thick, suffocating pall of smog – a London that is being stalked by the sinister Hyde in Robert Stevenson's

The Strange Case of Jekyll and Hyde.

Year 11, having already completed the readings necessary for GCSE exams when they were in Year 10, have started to revisit and revise their course so that they are fully prepared for their first mock examinations for English, which will be English Language Paper 1 on the 7th November, and English Literature Paper 2 on the 8th November. We are more confident than ever that last year's incredible success in GCSE English will be repeated. The English Department is also more determined than ever to put the importance of reading in the forefront of our students' minds. Slogans such as 'Children Need to Read' will never be a laboured point at Ernest Bevin. We recognise, as government studies have reported, that **'regularly reading stories or novels outside of school is associated with higher scores in assessments'**, even in assessments for subjects such as Maths. That is why all our students, from Years 7 – 10, will be reading a novel for pleasure during form time every week. This will not be an assessed novel – it's just for fun. We're calling this programme 'Bevin's Big Read! – a programme in which students will read aloud the same title.

After the half term, we are also revamping our homework system in English. As part of this, we are inviting you, the parents who know our students best, to push your son's journey to become a motivated reader by ensuring they read at least thirty minutes a night from a select list of exciting titles. Reading out loud can be like going for a run - it gets easier every time. Motivated readers will then compete for prizes for those who manage to read the most. Providing an audience for your son's reading at home could be hugely motivational for them, so we do encourage you when you have time to listen to your son reading. Students will also be given easy to access online quizzes as part of their homework to test their recall and ensure they reflect on their learning.

Karting Success

A big well done to **Max in Year 10**, who will be competing in both the Regional Final of the British Indoor Karting Championship and the National Final of the Total Karting Zero Electric Southern Championship at the end of October.

Max first began karting in 2015, winning a number of junior local indoor events. After a few years away from racing, he began the sport again in 2021 and reached the regional finals of the British Indoor Karting Championship, finishing in fifth place and just missing out on the National Final.

This year, Max competed in the Total Karting Zero Electric Southern Championship, finishing with a place on the podium in five out of six championship rounds - claiming third place overall and the Bronze medal. Max will be competing in the National Final with the top ten drivers nationwide to be UK Champion.

Max also recently won a local qualifying round in the 2022 British Indoor Karting Champinship and will be racing in the Regional Final in Basildon.

Over the weekend of 7th - 10th October, 10 cadets and two staff travelled in the college minibus to Lympstone in Devon. This small village just south of Exeter is home to the Commando Training Centre of the Royal Marines. It is also the venue for the annual competition between all Royal Marines Combined Cadet Force contingents from across the UK.

Cadets take part in 12 disciplines, ranging from hard physical slog such as the Endurance Course and the Stretcher Race to tests of knowledge, memory and concentration such as navigation, first aid and observation.

The Ernest Bevin cadets improved their score by 125 points compared with last year and achieved third place (out of 16 teams) for drill and a highly impressive second place for teamwork.

Sleeping in an unheated warehouse, getting up by 0600 each day and working hard all day, it was not a surprise that the minibus home was quieter than the journey to Lympstone - as all cadets were sound asleep, arriving back at college by 7pm on the Sunday.

Mr Kay and the School Staff Instructor Mr Riches were very proud of the cadets who were complimented by a wide variety of competition organisers for their exceptional team spirit and behaviour.

Students can apply to join the cadets towards the end of April in Years 8 and 9. Cadets train after college every Tuesday during term and one weekend per month. They can also take part in a week-long camp every July.
